The sidewalk is no place for spectators or firefighters not wearing **SCBA**.

Those that love what others hate and withhold harsh words in the face of those who spit anger at them are stronger than we realize. Those who lift up the broken only do so because they know that they too were once lifted up by someone.

In closing, if you know a leader who work fervently know that you only see a portion of their efforts, in reality they never stop. FIRST RESPONDER SAFETY AWARENESS

Assaults against First Responders have been on the rise with no end in sight. Assessing scene safety is a priority on EVERY call for service. Remember, there is no such thing as a 'Routine' call. Establishing scene safety is the first thing we must do before entering the scene. We are used to looking for hazards, (wires down, fuel spill, etc..) but are we forgetting indicators of violence or criminal activity?

When approaching the scene, pay attention to detail. Communicate with dispatch, obtain as much information as possible. Stop, look and listen. Look at the layout of the scene. Do you see anything out of place, broken windows, drug use, weapons or blood? Do you hear a verbal altercation? Do you smell alcohol, drugs, chemicals, smoke?

Here are some brief tips to consider:

- Set up a staging area, call for the resources you need in a orderly fashion.
- Knock and Announce 'FIRE DEPARTMENT' before entering. Keep announcing until contact is made. Remember, someone inside might think you are an intruder.
- Scan the scene for potential weapons. Anything can be used as a weapon, not just conventional guns, knives, etc.
- Look for escape routes, safe areas, cover/concealment.
- Do not overcrowd the area of the event. You may hinder a quick escape if required.
- Continually scan the scene, be careful to avoid tunnel vision.
- If something doesn't feel right, BACK OUT! There is no shame in waiting for police to secure the scene.
- If no exigent circumstances exist, time and distance are you friend. Don't rush in
- Never turn your back on the threat.
- When it comes to your safety, anything goes. These tips can be used at any event we respond to as the Greensburg Fire Department.
- Stay safe, see you there

ENGINE EQUIPMENT STANDARDIZATION

It must be reinforced, on the fireground, the GVFD operates as one Department - not six individual companies. To ensure speed and efficiency when operating at any incident, it is important to standarize tools and equipment. Any GVFD member familiar with his own company engine should be able to work off any of the other Engines in the GVFD Fleet. This includes cross-lay configuration, and location of gas meters, vent fan, and tools just to mention a few necessary important items to consider. (Continued)

REMEMBER....WE cannot work together efficiently if WE don't train together. This past year's effort in Department Training has been **OUTSTANDING**. The Citizens of our City should be proud of the dedication you have all exhibited!

Situational Awareness

The Ability to perceive what is happening around you & the understanding of what is happening around you.

KNOX BOX KEYS

Assistant & Deputy Assist. Chiefs, and Captains are issued a Key for the City Knox Box System. Those who are issued keys are personally responsible for their key and the key must be carried by only the person who signed for the key. At no time, due to liability to the Fire Department & the City of Greensburg, shall a Knox Box key be placed on City Fire Apparatus. Missing keys shall be investigated.

Remember to be Professional on the Radio Speaks Volumes for OUR Department's INTEGRITY. Engine Equipment Standardization (continued)

This month, all hose carried on the Engines was tested. Directives were issued to each Engine Company, noting tool and appliance necessary re-arrangement requirements. All hose after testing, was repacked to standardize each Engine. Inspection of each Engine was also done to determine to ensure that all are in compliant with the directive to have each Engine set-up similarly in as many regards as possible. This includes equipment location and mounting, hose loads, nozzle selections, and overall uniformity.

Directives included:

- Gas Detection Meters To be located in the cab, preferably behind the driver's seat if there is room, if not behind the Officer's seat, and all meters should be grouped in a single carrying case. (This would include Truck 2).
- Halligan Bar / Flat Head Axe / K-Tool To be located in the cab, and mounted on the tool board. (This would include Truck 2).
- Blowhard Fan, (battery operated) location should be in the Officer's side, rear lower compartment, accessible from the curb side door. (Engine 6 is excluded because of cord reel – rather the fan is located on Officer's side, rear lower compartment).
- 3.00" Hose Clamp located above the pump panel, on the Driver's side.
- **2.50" Double Male and Double Female Adapters** one of each to be located in both of the pump panel compartments, which is the first compartments rear of the cab.
- 4.00" X 5.00" Storz Adapters one each to be located in the pump panel compartments.
- Distributor Nozzle(s) located in the Officer's side pump panel compartment.
- 2.50" Nozzle locate in the Officer's side pump panel compartment.
- High-Rise Hose Packs (2) located in the Officer's side, rear upper compartment.
- **20# Dry Chemical Extinguisher** mounted exterior on the rear face of the Driver's side, high compartment.
- Tool Bag (containing screw drivers, pliers, Allen wrenches, adjustable wrench, vice grips, etc.) – located in the Officer's side, rear upper compartment.
- Decontamination equipment 5-gallon bucket, garden hose w / nozzle, scrub brush(s), 1.50" x garden hose adapter, and shower head connection located in the driver's side lower rear compartment.
- Rapid Intervention Team (RIT) Pack located in driver's side upper compartment.

Times and Numbers ... please!

After a couple of months of preliminary work, the NEW GVFD Fire Incident Reporting System is up and running. The Department realized there was a better way to keep track of incidents and training. In order to better comply with the Officer of the State Fire Commissioner and the Federal Government with NFIRS, it was determined that we needed to switch software vendors with a more updated and friendlier system. We are now with Emergency Reporting or Penn FIRS.


The GVFD is on the end of the Insurance Safety Office (ISO) audit and it has been emphasized that we need to be as accurate as we can be on reporting our incident response times. It is no longer acceptable to record one set of times for a full Station 79 response.

Each piece of apparatus must be accounted for when responding to an alarm. This includes: Time Dispatched, Time Enroute; Time on Scene, and Time Cleared; and if applicable Time cancelled.

The department was able to obtain from County Dispatch a daily report of the 'time-set' for each piece of apparatus for each incident on a daily basis.

The data reported is only accurate if proper radio protocols are followed. All radio transmissions must be clear and understandable and all radio transmissions must be acknowledged by the receiver of the transmission. Please speak up and clearly when ever you transmit and make sure you receive an acknowledgement to ensure that your message was received. It is critical that this happens with all radio transmissions.

Always practice good sound radio protocols—speak up and be clear, and with wait for an acknowledgement so you know that you have been received and always acknowledge when you you receive a rmessage. You never know when that next radio transmission is going to be a matter of life or death.



The Greensburg Volunteer Fire Department Relief Association

Back in 1736 in Philadelphia, Ben Franklin encouraged the formation of the Union Fire Company and since then, Volunteer Emergency Service Organizations have been providing much-needed fire protection and lifesaving services to communities across the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The Relief Association of the Greensburg Volunteer Fire Department is a complete separate entity of the Fire Department. It serves as an Association to handle proceeds generated from distributed PA State Funds from a 2% tax on property insurance premiums from Insurance Companies that are not Pennsylvania Insurance Companies. Funds are annually distributed to municipalities based on formula of size and population. Use of the Foreign Fire Insurance premium tax monies generated is restricted and can only be spent by the Commonwealth Fire Departments for health, safety, member death benefits and training. Relief Associations in the Commonwealth are subject to the Rules of the Pennsylvania State Auditor General, and must adhere to rigorous accounting and inventory controls or face the consequences of being disqualified to receive annual allocated state funds. The Greensburg Volunteer Fire Department Relief Association is comprised of three elected members by and from each station, the Fire Chief, and three Fire Chief Appointed representatives. In addition, the GVFD Relief Association Board is supplemented with a Quartermaster, charged with inventory and purchasing, and a Fire Department Attorney. RA Officers are elected by the Relief Association Board.



GVFD Emergency Vehicle Operations Refresher

The Greensburg Fire Department 'EVOT" Emergency Vehicle Driver's Training Competency Course for 2019 is underway. This course, based on Appex "A" of NFPA 1002, is designed to measure driver proficiency in handling emergency vehicles. The course is part of our own 'In House Training' and is conducted annually for all drivers as ordered by Chief Thomas Bell. This is only a portion of training required to be recognized as a certified Emergency Vehicle Driver for the Greensburg Volunteer Fire Department.

This course will be offered several different dates and time including weekdays & weekends, daytime and evening to accommodate personal schedules of the GFD members. As a reminders, if you operate a piece of equipment during training, it does NOT automatically make you a driver. Contact your Company Captain or drivers training officer to continue education. LEARN THE STREETS

All of us that drive fire apparatus in the city, one time or another have drawn a blank on a location when responding to an alarm. Spotted Dog, which is in all the engines and in an application on almost everyone's smartphone device gives turn-by-turn audio directions. When doing driver's training, learn the streets! When driving your personal car around the city, pay attention, especially if you are a fire department driver, and LEARN the streets. There should be absolutely no excuse to end up on the opposite of town when responding to an alarm, if you are a driver. You have a responsibility. If you are not sure, ask Dispatch for cross-streets or directions. If you are lost, TURN YOUR EMERGENCY LIGHTS OFF. Hopefully it will never come to this.

VEHICLE INSPECTIONS

Our fire apparatus are not considered commercial vehicles, but they do fall under commercial vehicle rules when being driven non-emergency, such as a fuel run, driver's training, or picking up equipment. Our fire trucks are exempt from Vehicle Safety Inspections when responding to an emergency. But the moment the truck leaves the station non-emergency, there needs to be a record of a recent vehicle safety inspection. You, as the driver, are responsible for ensuring this procedure is done. Report forms are available from the City Garage.

REMINDERS FROM THE CHIEF...

- Any accident or injury involving City Equipment and/or general public property, <u>no matter how minor</u>, must have a City PD Incident & Accident Report filed.
- Keep the Jabber on the radio off the airwaves, only transmit what absolutely needs to be communicated especially during an incident.
- Please email Lou any Company Event information so it may be included in the Fire Bell.
- The GVFD does not fill swimming pools
- Please request an incident number each and every time you are out of station for fire department activities. This includes Company Drills. This is for insurance purposes.
- Please remember the Provident Insurance Policy
- Social Media/Press Releases Do not answer questions pertaining to GVFD Codes/Laws or Programs. Refer to the Chief
- Be Aware of all hazards. Never do "blind-barehanded" searches for keys and the like.

"Knowing the Hose Loads" | by Assistant Chief Rick Hoyle

It has been said that the most important life-saving tactic performed at the scene of a fire is stretching and operating an attack line to extinguish the fire. But this basic fire ground operation is often taken lightly and performed poorly.

As we keep with our mission to operate as one department, one important element we need to have an understanding of is our hose loads. Since the recent hose testing was accomplished, the time was opportune to make the hose loads on each of the GFD engines universal. This means that it does not matter which engine company you belong to the hose compartments are all set-up the same;

- The pre-connected attack lines are all arranged in the "Minuteman" configuration. Each one affords 100' to be deployed from the rig and shoulder loaded.
- The 3.00" hose compartment has 600' on each engine. It should be pointed out to each member that this is NOT to be used as the first selection when laying out from a hydrant. The male coupling, and no longer female, is the leading coupling. The 3.00" will be considered for use as a large caliber hand-line, to supply ground monitors, or to supply between pumpers when offering booster tank water.
- The LDH is to be the hose of choice when operations warrant laying a supply line from a hydrant, and in some cases for suppling an aerial device. Our LDH hose is hodge-podge, whereby some of our engines carry supply, and others attack / supply, which has all to do with what pressures can be operated through each safely, it is important to know which you run with. Plans are being formalized to see that all GFD engines will one day be outfitted with 5.00", LDH, specific for operating as attack / supply.

An important part of preparing to use any of the hose carried, is for the companies to conduct drills. As hose is deployed, members gain knowledge and understanding for how best to remove the hose from the apparatus. Likewise, they become proficient at reloading the hose the correct way.

Each engine, except Engine 1, has 150' of 1.75" hose loaded in the front cross lays, and all engines have 200' hose loads on the rear pre-connects. Because of their first-due area includes buildings with a larger set-back, Engine 1 carries more. The 150' hose load was chosen because, when deployed correctly, it can be advanced up a vertical stairwell 5 floors with a 50' building set-back. This reduces the need for having an excess amount of hose, either outside or in the building, that contributes to kinking which then risks losing pressure at the nozzle. In a time when the initial on-scene personnel may be limited, there may not be anyone to play-out the extra hose.

Company members **NEED** to have an understanding that there are several options available when determining where the nozzle is to go to effect fire attack. If there is question that the 150' load may come up short, choose a rear pre-connect at 200'. Finally, there are two, (2), 100' "High-rise" packs on each engine. This is another go-to option for extending a hand-line.

Knowing your hose loads, and how to effectively and efficiently stretch them can only come **through practice**.

| PPE USE

In a study conducted by Drexel University, firefighters were asked why they sometimes refrain from using PPE in dangerous situations. In response, firefighters said they feel pressured to do so in order to maintain the image of being a daredevil.

Jennifer Taylor, PhD, associate professor in Drexel's Dornsife School of Public Health and her team, used data from 123 firefighters interviews across the country to conduct the study.

"Our society has a romanticized notion of what firefighters do, which is kill themselves," Anthony, a firefighter of 20-plus years, said in the study. "And we do everything we can in the fire service to reinforce that."

Perception over safety | Popular culture certainly falls in line with that view of firefighters. The film "Backdraft" featured a Kurt Russell character who increasingly put himself into dangerous situations, such as charging through a burning house without support — or an SCBA. In FX 's "Rescue Me," Dennis Leary's character followed suit.

"If firefighters feel that the public expects them to take risks to save other lives and property, firefighters may internalize the belief that getting injured on the job or dying in the line of duty is an expected outcome of work," Taylor explained.

One firefighter in the study with more than 30 years of experience described the second floor rescue of a woman that he once witnessed.

"He removes his SCBA while he's in the smoky environment and then proceeds to give her air, which, on TV, looks like this sensationally heroic act. Really, it's pure foolishness," the firefighter said. "Even when you're in an aircraft they tell you [to] get yourself oxygen before you help someone else. But because it would look good in the press, he takes his SCBA off ... Now both of them have been exposed exceedingly long compared to how quickly they would have both made it out [had he not wasted his time and air]."

Goal Seduction | The desire to achieve goals or finish tasks is a strong factor in the use of safety equipment, the researchers found. Termed "goal seduction," personal protective equipment is often viewed as a detriment to it.

Overhaul is the period when the main fire is extinguished but more work needs to be done to prevent fire hidden in walls or other areas from spreading. Many firefighters don't use their breathing apparatus at that point, even though smoke and other carcinogens remain in the air. This can be the result of peer pressure but also out of a desire to finish the task unimpeded.

Firefighters told the Drexel team that wearing packs during overhaul is hot and cumbersome, so they often take it off. One firefighter also described never wearing the chinstrap for his helmet.

"It's easier for me to pull my helmet off and ... look up or whatever," said Xavier, a 20-plus year veteran of the fire service.

Safety gear proponents | Ultimately, Taylor and the other researchers determined that two factors worked in favor of using the safety equipment: individual will and organizational solidarity.

Between training and personal knowledge of the injury or illness that could arise from not using the right equipment, some firefighters had the wherewithal to refuse peer pressure against using the safety equipment.

"If you're going to make fun of me, you're going to make fun of me," said Kate, a 33-year-old firefighter with less than 10 years on the job. "But I'm not going to use an inhaler later on in life."

Leading by example was particularly effective, according to the interviews. When use of safety equipment became a team-wide commitment, it made the interviewed firefighters more cognizant of properly using it and less likely to feel out-of-place.

"Organizational solidarity can do a lot to help recruits follow protective equipment standard operating procedures," Taylor said. "If the overall goal of the group is to protect themselves from the known hazards of the job, then most people in the group will follow that behavior."

In Conclusion | There are no excuses for not using PPE. This includes the overhaul phase. Until the atmosphere has been monitored and deemed safe, all PPE, including the SCBA should remain in place. Even after the CO levels have been deemed safe, the particles in the smoke still contain the carcinogens. Keep yourself safe!



THE IMPORTANCE OF THE 360 SIZE UP

February 14th is Valentines Day and sticks firmly in my memory as the day three Firefighters from the City of Pittsburgh died in the line of duty at the Bricelyn Street Fire. The LODD involved Capt. Thomas A. Brooks, FF Patricia A. Conroy and FF Mark R. Kolenda.


Although the final report indicated several items that contributed to the fatalities, one item in particular stands out to me. The structure was a 1 ½ story single family frame building as it appears from the street. Entry was made into the structure on the alpha side, division 1. The team advanced the hand-line down the stairs to the basement (sub-division 1). Fire erupted behind the Firefighters burning through the hose line and collapsing the stairs. Attempts to break out windows with hand tools and their helmets were unsuccessful due to heavy plastic added to each window.

Calls for help on the radio indicated that they were in the basement. Unknown to the trapped Firefighters, there was an additional level below sub-division 1. Firefighters on the outside acted as expected and entered the basement (sub-division 2) from the "C" side of the structure to attempt a rescue. Unfortunately, the attempted rescue was conducted on sub-division 2, the true basement, and the three trapped Firefighters were on sub-division 1 one floor up. During this operation, another Firefighter was trapped and rescued leaving the rescuers falsely believing that everyone was rescued and accounted for.

Lessons learned: An initial 360 survey would have quickly identified the structure as having 1 ½ stories up from the front of the building and two additional floors below street level. Accountability would have helped identified those missing and facilitated additional search and rescue.

All three Firefighters died as a result of smoke inhalation due to running out of breathing air in the SCBA.

This is written not to find fault but to "Live and Learn". Rest in peace Tom, Patty and Mark.
